This is incredibly challenging and most of our classes have achieved this for the Accelerated Reader program. With many reaching the same status for the Accelerated Maths program.

Students have been making incredible progress with both their literacy and numeracy results using the Renaissance Learning programme. This has gained The Boulevard Academy national and international recognition.

The Boulevard Academy has been awarded Master School status for Accelerated Maths and Accelerated Reader. This means students have achieved the gold standards (for making optimum progress) over a period of twenty five weeks or longer. This is very difficult to achieve and for so many students to achieve this is staggering. We are thrilled!

Master school has never been awarded before in the United Kingdom for recognition in numeracy. We are the only school to ever achieve this!

As for Accelerated Reader there is only one other school in the United Kingdom who have achieved this status.
