### The Holocaust Memorial Day

On the 27<sup>th</sup> of January 2015 a group of students visited the Guild Hall for The Holocaust Remembrance Day.

Once we arrived everyone who attended got given a stone to take into the hall. We had to put them underneath a candle, they represented people who had died in The Holocaust.

Hull's Lady Mayor said some words about her visit to Auschwitz. Later, Julia Kinch, the granddaughter of Iby Knill (an Auschwitz survivor herself) gave a speech about her grandmother and about how she only discovered her family's past once she was in college. Prior to this she'd had no idea she was related to someone who escaped the Holocaust.

Then we listened to a string trio perform some sacred music so we could reflect on what we had learned. The music was very inspiring.

Next a 6th form student gave a speech about what would have happened had the Germans won WW2. It made us realise and think about the possibilities. It was very thought- provoking.

To close the ceremony, a small choir sang some poems and hymns. They were very emotional, and the evening was closed with a representative of the Jewish community, reading a prayer in Hebrew.

### National Storytelling Week

National Storytelling week began on January 31<sup>st</sup> and to mark the event, students at The Academy were regaled with tales of derring-do, high jinks, mystery and adventure by a “Visitor from the Past”. Our visitor, a sailor by profession, told stories about the many strange sights witnessed by those aboard The Golden Hind, a ship captained by Sir Francis Drake in the late 1580s. The visitor described clashes between Drake’s men and Spanish-speaking natives, executions and shootings, caches of gold coins, buried skeletons and giant tree-climbing crabs. 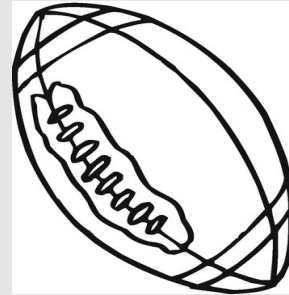
